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§ 1. The first Book mentioned in the Bible - Creation

'This is the Book of the Generation of Heaven and Earth, when it happened. In that day, God made the heaven and the earth and all green of the field, before it originated on the earth, and all the green plants of the field, before they sprang up. For God had not let it rain on the earth, and there was not a man to cultivate it. But a source rose up out of the earth and watered the whole face of the earth.

And God formed the man of dirt of the earth, and breathed upon his face the breath of life, and the man became a living soul.' { Genesis 2:4-7 Septuaginta Deutsch ¹ }

The opening chapters of the Bible, in the book of Genesis, tell us what it is about:

'This is the Book of the Generation of Heaven and Earth, when it happened. In that day God made the heaven and the earth', The Book of the Origins of Heaven and Earth, when they were made, in what time *YHWH ELOHIM* made them.

- a) book: literally, 'η βιβλος', 'the Byblos', the Bible;
- b) intent: it is a consciously written book, not a random arrangement of unrelated events;
- c) subject: the generation of heaven and earth, how they came to be;
- c) time: it describes the age in which God created heaven and earth (possibly by family trees);
- d) Who: it shows Who made heaven and earth, it was not a random process, but a conscious event;
- e) a man: it says how mankind was created.

Interesting is what this text states about the creation of men:

1. First there is no green, no plants have been created yet, for *'God had not let it rain on the earth'*.

This verse relates to the human food supply through agriculture. Since there was no rain yet on Earth, no green plants have evolved, so there was nothing to eat for human beings yet. First the Earth needs rain, then the 'green plants of the field' will come into being, after that God creates man and he will be able to cultivate the field (*there was not a man to cultivate it*), so he can eat from the produce of nature and survive. Without farming mankind dies. The order is pure logic.

2. So God made it rain on Earth. The author of Genesis seems to have had a kind of a Vision, or he makes use of an earlier text of the one who had this vision.

He sees a huge source of water in the Earth (*but a source rose up out of the earth and watered the whole face of the earth*), by which the entire surface of the Earth is drenched with water.

He seems to have had a particular view over the Earth in a spiritual vision by which the Divine Spirit revealed to him how Life on Earth originated.

Like Genesis chapter 1, so also Genesis chapter 2 –until here– describes in beautiful simple words, like in a sketch, the origination, *that is the GENESIS* of Life on Earth in a way that every reader would be able to understand.
